CHAIR REPORT

There are two well-known phrases or whakatauki that come to mind in writing this report: + Titiro whakamuri, Kokiri whakamua - Look back and reflect so that you can move forward. + The only thing that remains constant is change.

The only thing that remains constant is change. It means that the world is always changing and so are people. Not only is change always constant, but it is also unavoidable. Change is hard and at times uncomfortable, but change is normal. Changing the way we would normally do things can be difficult and requires patience, support, effort, planning and resilience. Yet change is also healthy; it gives us something to strive for.

This past year has been the very definition of change. There has been a lot of uncertainty, and the continual need to adapt to the changing Covid landscape, so on reflection there is also so much we can be proud of. We continue to see and hear the desire for our people to enjoy the sport we all love and the way that our clubs have enabled that in different ways has been amazing.

Our 2020 district survey suggested many players had never heard of Squash Wellington. So that players understand who is behind many of the events they participate in and know who to come to with their suggestions, offers of assistance, questions, praise and even complaints, this year the Board put significant focus on lifting district squash players' awareness of Squash Wellington. We did this by upping our game on social media (Facebook and Instagram), by making regular and engaging posts about all sorts of district squash activity, and launching In the SWing, our monthly newsletter accessed via Facebook and email.

We have received extremely positive feedback about our engagement this year, in particular that people feel far more connected to other clubs and the squash community generally. We are proud that during 2021, when many people felt isolated from whanāu, friends and colleagues through lockdowns and distancing, we were able to make people feel more connected to squash than ever before. Having active platforms that showcase the enjoyment received from the best sport in the world was so important to us that we created a new district award to recognise its importance!

While we saw a lot of events cancelled in 2021, including some national events scheduled to be held in Wellington, our clubs continued to find different ways to keep members and their communities informed and engaged. Some examples of this were through regular and clear communications, adaption to club days and events enabling people to continue to play in a safe and managed environment. Even changing tournaments from 2–3 days to a 1–day tournament as Island Bay trialled.

We were thrilled at the effort made by several clubs to raise mental health awareness through squash for World Squash Day – and significant funds were raised for the Mental Health Foundation too – well done whānau!

CHAIR REPORT

As the environment changed again in the last quarter of 2021, we were able to host two national events at Hutt City Squash. Players and supporters adapted well to new ways of working and I believe that holding these events was a strong signal to the wider community that we can continue to showcase and grow our game, just in slightly different ways. Change is constant.

The Squash Wellington Board also experienced change. We welcomed new co-opted members, Malcolm Thomas from Tawa, and Greg Grant from Khandallah on the Board following the last AGM with their co-opted terms ending at the 2022 AGM.

One of our most noticeable changes was saying farewell to Willie Bicknell in August after working for Squash Wellington for 10 years: a constant figure in our community with a wealth of squash knowledge across our region, well respected within it and beyond. Change can be unsettling but it also provides us with opportunities to welcome fresh eyes and perspectives in a constantly changing environment. To that end, we welcomed Russell Henderson into an interim role as District Administrator while a more permanent role was being scoped.

I would like to acknowledge the entire Board: Catharine Sayer, Malcolm Thomas, and Greg Grant for their hard work behind the scenes. We have had to make some tough decisions as a result of Covid, including its variant strains. These decisions are never taken lightly but always with our members at front of mind.

Our thanks to Russell: his energy and pragmatic approach has guided our clubs through a number of changes through the Covid traffic light system and most recently CPF. It hasn't been an easy task but actioned with urgency and consideration of the different needs of our clubs and their members. This has not gone unnoticed by all of us so thank you Russell.

The Board also extends its gratitude to our volunteers that support the administration of our programmes and initiatives. Nicola-Ward Thomas, Interclub Convenor, and Bryan Smith, Masters Convenor, who work tirelessly behind the scenes to deliver some of our in demand activities.

Lastly, we must acknowledge all the clubs, their Presidents, Committees, staff, volunteers, and members. It has been another disruptive year, a longer than usual season has seen clubs and their members extend their events and support longer than usual. Change can be difficult and requires patience and resilience. You have all done an exceptional job, thank you for your amazing work.

NZ Senior Individual – Oliver Sport NZ Squash Classic Due to Covid, the NZ Seniors and Teams events were cancelled and replaced with the Oliver Sport NZ Classic and NZ Senior Teams Classic.

NZ Senior Classic, held at Hutt City, saw the top 32 domestic players compete in the two-day tournament. Wellington was well represented across both men's and women's draws with the current New Zealand Champion, Evan Williams leading the men's draw. Typically playing big title matches in other cities it was great to be able to support Evan and other Wellington players on our home turf in Wellington. The last Senior Nationals held in Wellington was 1971 so it was great to host this event, for the players and for the district.

After moving through the 32 draw relatively comfortably, Evan went on to secure yet another title 3–1. A magnificent achievement continuing an unbeaten streak since 2020.

Wellington Development Squads

This year we introduced three new district player development programmes catering to Juniors, Seniors, and Masters. The programmes delivered on one of our strategic priorities under Court-Related Skill Development and are the cornerstone of our regional representative structure which aims to lift our player capability.


The Junior and Senior programmes were held over a 10-month period and delivered by the Evan Williams Coaching team, led by Evan Williams. Integrated within the 10-month programme were specialist services such as sessions with nutrition and fitness professionals. Each carefully planned camp was designed to give participants the technical and tactical skills and support to progress along the representative pathway and was well subscribed by over 40 players. They were also designed to build up player camaraderie, bonding and district 'belonging', to encourage players to play for each other rather than as individuals.

The Masters programme, led by Matt Green, was very well subscribed with over 20 players across the region signing up. Held over a 5-month period with players ranging from D-A grade the camps combined technical and tactical skills suitable for all, plus a lot of fun and laughter was had.

In addition to their unique programming, both camps included match analysis to complement the physical aspect of the programme. Aimed at growing the whole player physically, mentally, and tactically, the informal and formal feedback we received overwhelmingly supported a continuation of the overall model.


The national event, another casualty to COVID, did not go ahead in 2021, for the first time in recent memory.
