2023 TOURNAMENT CALENDAR

The 2023 Tournament Calendar is even more packed with amazing squash events than our 2022 calendar. Here are a few key facts and figures to get you looking forward to next year.

Not including Interclub, the Wellington district plays host to 67 district and club events next year, as well as 2 national events! When you bear in mind that the playing season is 47 weeks long, there's plenty to choose from.

DISTRICT TOURNAMENTS

These tournaments look set to be awesome in 2023.

Wellington Open – hosted by **Hutt City**, 9–11 June. The Open returns to the Hutt in 2023, following the biggest one ever (or at least for a long time). Could it be even bigger this time round?

Wellington Junior Open – hosted by **Tawa**, 17-19 August. With the addition of their brand new fourth court, and as the home club of the Squash NZ Most Improved Junior Player, this is set to be a great competition.

Wellington Masters – hosted by **Mana**, 1-3 September. The Masters returns to Mana, who have previously done an amazing job of hosting this event. Capping off a seven-round Master of Masters series, this will see some high stakes!

Wellington Doubles – hosted by Hutt City, 24-25 November. Now scheduled during the long and ever growing run of dubs tournies, and with a few tweaks made in response to the 2022 debit event, players will once again get to enjoy this growing form of the game on some of the country's only full size doubles courts.

We are looking forward to another amazing weekend of SuperChamps in 2023, for many it's the highlight of the playing calendar.

We will be revealing some revised rules and guidelines for SuperChamps early next year which aim to find the perfect balance of participation and competition.

Next year, the **9Hundy** series grows, with **7** events (**Island Bay**, **Red Star**, **Wainuiomata**, **Mana**, **Martinborough**, **Upper Hutt and Hutt City**).

We also see the reformatted **Wairarapa Juniors and Masters**, hosted by **Red Star**, making for a fun (but seriously competitive) weekend for the whole family.

As well as the **Wellington Junior Open**, we see the return of the **NZ Junior National Individuals**, and **NZ Junior National Teams** events, once again at **Hutt City**.

Supporting the wahine, again, we have **2** multiday tournaments; the **Tawa Women's Open** in March, which coincides with International Women's Day, and the return of the **Hutt City Women's Open** in April, which debuted in 2022.

The **800 series** returns with **6** events (**Khandallah**, **Upper Hutt**, **Club Kelburn**, **Red Star**, **Thorndon**, **Wainuiomata**).

MASTERS EVENTS

The Master of Masters series is shaping up to be a biggie in 2023, with 7 tournaments – up from 5 in 2022.

This starts early in the season with the Hutt City Masters Age Groups in February, and culminates with the Wellington Masters at Mana in September. Don't forget to stretch! Don't like reffing A Graders? For those who enjoy the B & Below format, there are plenty of these happening in the heart of the season.

Ham & Turkey is perhaps the original innovative tournament, and still going strong at Tawa.

Island Bay are introducing a singles one-dayer in the heart of the doubles season, providing an antidote to four-on-a-court fun for those who want a last chance to make the next grade before the season ends. Along with the **Hutt City** one-dayer doubles this makes a Labour Weekend squash bonanza for those who want the best of both worlds.

Capping off the year is the new **Thorndon** (did anyone mention that they're National Club of the Year yet?) 'Fun Tournament'. Exact details to be revealed, but this won't be played for points, so will make for a light-hearted end to the season.

And that doesn't even include the likes of the **Mana** Summer Leagues, the **Wainuiomata** Business House, and the various Intraclubs and Club Champs happening all over the district.

Interclub sees a slight change of format, in response to club and player feedback, as well as turnout in 2022.

Masters Interclub will continue to have separate summer and spring seasons at either end of the year, but will now have a longer winter season, running alongside **Women's Interclub**.

We now have a longer break for **Men's/Mixed Interclub** and **Women's Interclub**; 4 weeks rest between autumn and winter, and another 4 weeks rest between winter and spring to allow players to recharge their batteries and prepare for the next round (although no doubt many will be playing back-to-back tournies).

In total, we have **22** weeks of **Men's/Mixed Interclub**, **22** weeks of **Women's Interclub**, and **20** weeks of **Masters Interclub**.
