# Watts Up

This month Kaitlyn Watts, enjoying her highest world ranking of 77, chats exclusively to In the SWing writer **Catharine Sayer** on the life of an emerging squash pro.

Most local women readers, having lost to Kaitlyn Watts at least once in their "careers", will be shocked to learn that Palmerston North's Kaitlyn Watts is only 21. It comes as a relief that Kaitlyn doesn't volunteer memories of her comfortable win in three against her interviewer at a Foxton B& Below tournament many moons ago. Given the likely significance of the contest to Watts' career path, we'll ascribe her silence to modesty, that or politeness.

I'm meeting Watts to gain an insight into the life of a young pro giving the international scene a shot. Watts's preference to meet in the Devoy Squash weights room over my offer of an upmarket cafe hints at the no-frills nature of the tour. Briefly back in New Zealand to compete, thanks to the first major PSA event in decades, Watts reveals that most of her time is spent in the Scottish capital, Edinburgh, training at Heriot-Watt University with Scotland's national squad. Her way in to the training group was no accident: its assistant coach, Kylie Lindsay, is a

former New Zealand international and its calibre is assured by the presence in a coaching capacity of recently retired Australian player Donna Lobban.

Watts' fix of the club atmosphere so familiar to New Zealanders comes from membership of the Edinburgh Sports Club, Edinburgh's pre-eminent racquets venue. Its offerings provide the community spirit so important for a newbie trying to navigate life in a new hemisphere. Watts enthuses about her new set-up, even praising the capital's bus network on which her daily movements rely.

Lindsay has oversight of Watts's weekly schedule, generally comprising one or two daily squash sessions with plenty of fitness thrown in. Lindsay herself, or the squad's head coach Paul Bell, provide on-court technical input while Watts's former coach, New Zealand international Kashif Shuja, based in Taupo, is available by phone for

miscellaneous advice on request. Pastoral and development wrap-around support comes courtesy of a monthly chat with a dedicated High Performance Sport New Zealand Performance Life Coach.

Navigating the professional squash tournament schedule, however, is a matter for Watts to figure out. Giving herself stretch opportunities in terms of available ranking points and game development and a chance of receiving a small amount of prizemoney (usually in the hundreds rather than thousands of euros) needs to be netted off against the attendance costs, the aim being "not to come out too much in the red". Finding affordable accommodation is all part of the meticulous planning, players preferring to band together to find an AirBnB to avoid having to eat out for every meal.

It's unclear whether tournament selection expertise warrants a B.A. or a B.Sc. but under Lindsay's tutorship, her grade point average is solid.

Despite Watts being part of a small group of young Kiwi squash players trying to make their mark on the pro tour, connectivity between them is minimal. Watts reports that it's by luck rather than design should they find themselves playing the same tournament, although camaraderie is high when they do meet up, Watts reports, citing the World Doubles (Glasgow, 2022) and the Commonwealth Games (Birmingham, 2022) as prime examples.

Her chosen route to professional success-simply training and competing-is slightly going out of fashion, thanks to the crop of high achievers (well, obviously; we're squashies) in both the men's and women's ranks who've preferred to earn Ivy League degrees with a side helping of college squash. That route is "good for some, but not for others", suggests Watts, who seems to be thriving on the greater independence involved in her methodology.

Funding is slim but sufficient, with a small amount of prizemoney and New Zealand sponsorships-in exchange for occasional service endorsements and life updates-supplementing High Performance Sport New Zealand support. Watts's motivation clearly lies away from money; we don't discuss motivation in detail, but finding out just far how her talent, steely determination (as evidenced by her penchant for diving on the doubles court) and work ethic can get her seems to be what gets her out of bed on those cold Scottish mornings.

Watts gives off a relaxed vibe, perhaps down to spending quality time back home with her large family in between Nations Cup and NZ Open appearances. Her focus, she explains, is on improving her game:

"I'm confident that the ranking points will take care of themselves" is her mature prediction.

Given a leap of twelve places between our meeting and the latest publication, things are trucking along just nicely.
