2023 Wellington Open





Kāpiti Tournament Control: now iPhone Compatible!



I'm sure nearly everyone who's played at a tournament over the past few years will be well aware of the excellent Tournament Control program, developed by Digital Technology Kāpiti. This has been an amazing tool for Club Captains, allowing them to schedule matches, keep track of players, and display court schedules and results on a big TV screen for all to see. The accompanying Android app allows players to login and check the progress of a tournament remotely, which is a fantastic way of organising busy lives around scheduled matches.

Unfortunately, iPhone users have been unable to track the app, with no iOS version available. Shunned by our peers, the laughing stock of the changing rooms, we plead with our Google-orientated compadres to allow us to sneak a peek at the latest news from the current tournament.

Well that's all changed. Island Bay player Stephen "I Code For Fun" Garrett has translated the code from the Kāpiti Tournament Control platform and made it iPhone. available on Simply squashtc.com on your iPhone, and you will be able to view any current tournaments that are being run via Tournament Control, check the current court action, results, schedules, divisions, and so on.


Only ever played C grade - roughly 7 campaigns. 2023 will be the first year since 2015 not playing C grade but will be the tournament director for E grades at Island Bay.
