Key Highlights of 2024

Showcasing Wellington on the National Stage

Wellington had the privilege of hosting several premier national events in 2024, highlighting the dedication of our clubs and the incredible efforts of our volunteers. The NZ Secondary Schools Squash Championship and the NZ Masters Individual and Inter-District Teams Championships were both delivered to a high standard, thanks to the hard work of Hutt City, Wainuiomata, Upper Hutt, Tawa, and Mana Squash Clubs. These events demonstrated the power of collaboration among clubs in delivering exceptional competitions.

National Inter-District Team Titles

After a long hiatus, Squash Wellington celebrated major success, with two of our five representative teams securing National Inter-District Championship titles. Congratulations to our Senior Men's and Junior Girls' teams on their outstanding achievements.

New Zealand Representation

A special congratulations to Oliver Dunbar and Maiden-Lee Coe, who were selected to represent New Zealand in Australia earlier this year. Competing in the Trans-Tasman series as part of a strong Kiwi contingent, both players performed exceptionally. Oliver capped off the experience by winning the U19 Championship title at the Australian Junior Open-an incredible accomplishment.

NZ Secondary Schools Trans-Tasman series

Congratulations to Mackenzie Tait, Ben Jones, Eamon Gannon and Liberty Jones on their selection to represent New Zealand in the secondary school's series. The first part of this series saw the NZ team play state teams Queensland and New South Wales, then Australia. Another fantastic opportunity for our juniors, to represent the silver fern. Affiliation Fees and National Collaboration

Following two years of consultation and extensive collaboration across all districts, 2024 marked the successful launch of the new national affiliation model. This initiative has been a testament to the ability of districts and clubs to work together to strengthen the future of squash in New Zealand.

OPERATIONS REPORT

FAREWELL TO RUSSELL

In May, we farewelled Russell Henderson, our General Manager. Russell was a highly valued member of the Squash Wellington team, known for his calm, solution-focused, and pragmatic approach. His dedication and contributions were greatly appreciated by our clubs and members, and we sincerely thank him for his service.

Following Russell's departure, the Board made a strategic decision to pause recruitment for a replacement. This decision was influenced by two key factors: the deployment of a new competition platform and the introduction of a national fiveyear strategic plan.

Both initiatives will shape our own five-year strategy, including determining the necessary resources to support and implement our future direction.

In the coming weeks, clubs will be invited to participate in a hui to finalise our Strategic Direction. This process will help define the most effective role to support our goals and ensure the ongoing success of squash in our region.

FUNDING

Funding has remained a challenge at the national, district, and club levels, with numerous organisations competing for financial support to implement their strategic plans.

While the year has ended on a positive note, this outcome was largely due to not having to cover the costs of a staff member in the second half of the year.

Looking ahead to 2025, we have a well-structured funding schedule in place, with multiple funding requests already submitted. We will continue to build on established relationships with our current funders while exploring new opportunities, particularly in targeted regional areas where applicable.

COMPETITION

HEAD SERIES

In 2024, the HEAD series remained a popular choice, providing accessible and supportive entry points into competitive squash for women and junior players. The series maintained a strong focus on participation and upskilling in officiating skills. Prizes continued to be awarded based on overall series performance, with merchandise SportCo, a long-standing supplied by partner.

Due to high demand, we extended the HEAD Junior 9Hundy series for the second consecutive year, adding three extra rounds and bringing the total to 10.

This year also saw a slight increase in participation, with 90 players taking part. To encourage players from more geographically distant areas, we maintained the incentive of double entry points for rounds held in Wainuiomata, Otaki and Red Star.

DISTRICT TOURNAMENTS

The **Wellington Open** moved to the Wairarapa in 2024 and was hosted at Red Star Squash Club, with support from Masterton Squash Club. While attendance was lower than the previous year, the quality of squash remained high and exciting.

The Women's Final was a family affair between sisters Charlotte and Diana Galloway, with Charlotte claiming victory on this occasion. In the Men's Final, two familiar faces battled it out as Evan Williams faced Matt Green. Evan secured yet another Wellington Open title, adding to his impressive tally of 10.

The **Wellington Masters**, hosted by Khandallah in July, also saw slightly lower registrations than the previous year. However, the competition remained fierce, with several closely contested matches across the divisions.

The Open Finals delivered thrilling matchups, with Sam Atkins (Tawa) facing Brian George (Mana) and Nicki Gibbs (Kapiti) taking on Anna Marquis-Skepetaris (Thorndon). In the end, Sam and Anna emerged as the 2024 Masters Champions—a great warm—up for the NZ Masters Individual and Teams event, where both players performed exceptionally well. Congratulations to Anna, Sam, and all division winners and players.

Back to Hutt City where the **Wellington Doubles** tournament was held. On trend, the registrations were not as high as previous years however the competition was just as fierce.
